"Empire 100" Art Show Delights Visitors

While visitors to the opening receptions at the *Empire 100* Art Show and Sale enjoyed a kaleidoscope of artistic visions of the American West, the loyal volunteers who staffed the receptions at Northern Trust Bank on January 10 and 13 saw a steady stream of dots before their eyes. Not dots of fatigue or vertigo, but red dots as happy buyers placed them on the title cards of the artworks to mark their purchases.

Because of the huge crush of excited viewers last year–600 to be exact–the show organizers this year hosted guests in two smaller receptions. The first, on January 10, was for Foundation members and friends; the second on January 13, was for the broader public.

At the extremely well attended but smaller gatherings, people could really see the art well and visit with the artists, a majority of whom attended both events. There was a friendly buzz of excitement and laughter at the receptions, indicative of people who feel comfortable with one another and who are delighted to see splendid art surrounding them. The result was a tremendous response in sales.

The *Empire 100* Art Show is both invitational (25%) and juried (75%). Twenty five of the bestselling artists are invited to submit one piece unjuried to the next show. This pleases patrons who look forward to seeing work by their favorite artists again. The juried portion of the show provides open opportunity for new talent to be in-

cluded. This year there are 65 participating artists (see p. 3 list), 15 of them new to the show. Because the show exhibits high quality work and is very artist-friendly, interest pours in by word of mouth and from the Internet. The collection is predominately western, but it also has a number of "crossover" pieces that are more or less country in feeling, but not traditional in the pure western sense

A Record-Breaking Year

The following officers were unanimously elected to one-year terms at the November 15, 2004, board meeting:

President—Sarah Miller, of Tucson. A board member since 2003, and our past Treasurer, Sarah has been particularly central in the planning, design, and installation of the Foundation's new information displays covering the history and preservation of the Empire Ranch, featured at the Roundup and other events. She is sole proprietor of Miller Design.

Vice President—George A. Masek, of Sonoita. A board member since 1999, George has been actively involved in the Foundation's organization, management, and fundraising, as well as the art show jury review processes, and is our liaison to the Arizona Historical Society, a cosponsor of many ERF events.

Treasurer—Billie Donaldson, of Sonoita. A board member since 2001, Billie has been our previous board Vice President and Secretary and has been the central coordinator for ERF Fall Roundups and volunteer participation activities.

Secretary—Zeke Sinclair Browning, of Sonoita. Since becoming a board member in 2004, Zeke has been active in board planning activities and in developing historical narratives about the Empire. Deeply familiar with Southern Arizona and ranching, Zeke is a professional writer and avid horsewoman.

Introductions also are due for three board members elected during 2004:

Ian Tomlinson, of Tucson, elected in February, is a practicing attorney and a Seattle area native who moved to Tucson in 2001 to take an active role in managing his family's VeraEarl Ranch, which borders the Empire Ranch on the west.

Steve Boice, a past board president and true founding father of ERF, is also retiring due to term limits. It is no coincidence that during this same period the fledgling Empire Ranch Foundation grew from a vision and mission statement into a viable, contributing, membership organization with a detailed plan for the future and a string of accomplishments that illustrates how private-public partnerships can accomplish great things for the people and the land. Shela personally provided invaluable management support towards that growth.

Shela's new responsibilities will focus on borderlands issues, including planning and coordination between BLM and other U.S. and Mexican government agencies and task forces.

Since the Empire is caught up in these issues, she will have multiple occasions to continue working with the TFO on issues important to the Empire. Her office will be located in Tucson, and Shela pledges to remain a faithful ERF member and volunteer.

Wildlife Candid Cameras On Las Cienegas NCA

By Catie Fenn, Outdoor Recreation Planner, BLM Tucson Field Office Have you ever wondered what type of wildlife walks around the Empire Ranch and other areas within Las Cienegas National Conservation Area (NCA)? Las Cienegas Resource Specialist Keith Hughes already had a good idea, but thought it would be interesting to place a motion sensitive camera on a trail and wait for the results. The results were...very interesting.

Hughes says each new package of photos offers an ever increasing assortment of wildlife "caught on film." Some inhabitants of the area are the usual mule and white tail deer, javelina, bobcat, mountain lion, and an occasional drug smuggler, but the most recent unusual sighting was an opossum. While many of us don't recall ever seeing an opossum in Arizona, there have been reported sightings as early as 1947 in the Huachuca Mountains, about 25 miles southeast of the Empire Ranch.

Although records for sighting opossum in southeastern Arizona may represent escaped eastern Virginia Opossums brought in as pets, there are indications that this latest photo is that of a Mexican Opossum which adds evidence that it is slowly moving its range northwards from Mexico into Southern Arizona. Las Cienegas NCA staff can now add another animal to a lengthy wildlife list to monitor.

Preservation Projects Summary

Preservation of the Empire Ranch House and other buildings is a primary mission of the Foundation. Projects recently completed, underway, or scheduled are noted below. Projects we have previously shown as complete are not repeated here.

- Execute emergency repairs to Adobe Haybarn NE corner (Early 2005, depending upon urgency relative to other priorities now under investigation)
- Determine and correct causes of apparent moisture infiltration to Victorian Addition Master Bedroom walls and floor (top priority item)
- Create plan and stabilize Adobe Haybarn for the long term (priority item once funds are secured)
- Stabilize lintel over south entry of Zaguan/ Breezeway for the long term (plan complete; funding redirected in deference to other emergency repair needs)
- Execute emergency repairs to Ranch Hand's House (*Phase 2 is a priority* for funding)
- Straighten & stabilize leaning concrete garden wall (plan approved as nonvolunteer project; priority item once funds are secured)
- Emergency repairs to Children's Addition floor framing and walls (a priority item once funds are raised)
- BLM final approval of adaptive reuse plan for ranch buildings (*Early 2005*)
