Congratulations to Alison Bunting (ERF) and Jeff Simms (BLM) who were recently honored by the Cienega Watershed Partnership (CWP) and listed on the CWP Wall of Honor. The virtual Wall of Honor recognizes those who have made significant contributions in advancing the mission of the CWP and sustaining the Cienega Watershed.

Alison helped to develop programs which now define the CWP's heritage mission. These programs include the CWP oral history program; the Back Then Internship Program; and the Cienega Timeline Project. She is also an active member of the BLM LCNCA's Heritage Technical Team.

Jeff is a fisheries biologist and his dedication and passion are reasons why native fish and other native aquatic

species have successful LCNCA populations. From the time that BLM acquired LCNCA Jeff became immersed in inventorying, monitoring, planning, and improving this landscape He has been key in major multi-partner efforts to conserve native vertebrates, like the Mexican garter snake and Chiricahua leopard frog.

Catie made significant contributions to the Empire Ranch and LCNCA. Pascua Yaqui Chairman Peter Yucupicio honored Catie at her retirement party noting that YIW has provided valuable opportunities for Pascua Yaqui vouth to be outdoors and learn about their cultural heritage and its close ties with nature.

Historic Landscape Survey

ERF and BLM collaborated with the University of Arizona Drachman Institute to conduct a Historic American Landscape Survey (HALS) for the Empire Ranch. HALS is a federal documentation program in partnership with the American Society of Landscape Architects, the National Park Service (NPS) and the Library of Congress (LC) to create a permanent record of historic and cultural landscapes throughout the U.S.

Twelve University of Arizona students, under the direction of Professor R. Brooks Jeffrey, prepared a preliminary survey document after a review of ERF archival materials and several visits to the ranch. Landscape architects Helen Erickson and Gina Chorover and landscape historian Robin Lothrop Pinto will finalize the HALS report for submission to the NPS by July 2016 and ultimate archiving in the Library of Congress.

Empire Adobe Gets TLC

On March 16, 2016 the Empire Ranch was the site of a day long TICRAT workshop, with participants learning to assess and repair damage to historic adobe on the Ranch House and Adobe Haybarn.

TICRAT (in Spanish: Taller Internacional de Conservación y Restauración de Arquitectura de Tierra; in English: International Workshop on the Conservation and Restoration of Earthen Architecture) is an annual week-long international workshop on techniques and strategies for preserving earthen structures. This year's workshop, hosted by several public agencies and the University of Arizona's Drachman Institute, also included activities at four other historic sites in the Tucson area. Over 60 budding preservationists and expert instructors from the U.S. and Mexico, including ERF Board member David Yubeta, participated.

At the Empire Ranch, participants learned how to evaluate historic adobe by removing the cement stucco veneer at the base of the northeast corner of the ranch house. Areas evaluated as needing intervention were repaired; then were covered with a mud plaster to protect the historic adobe masonry. Other groups learned to tuckpoint—filling in the gaps in the adobe bricks and mortar joints—on the recently stabilized Adobe Haybarn.





Results of the adobe assessments will also be used to help the BLM develop the tasks in a stabilization contract for the Ranch House. We are very grateful to the group for its help in caring for these important structures!

Cottonwoods – more than just a backdrop

The green, shimmering leaves of Empire Gulch's cottonwood trees provide more than just a scenic setting for the ranch headquarters. Their presence signals the existence of a rich ecosystem and provides a link to one of the Arizona Territory's first leaders.

Cottonwoods are an iconic tree of the American West. Resilient, fast-growing and relatively short-lived, they require a high water table to propagate and survive. Their highly branched structure, along with the cool understory they create, pack a punch in terms of habitat. In some areas of the Southwest, streamside areas (also known as riparian) account for ninety percent of overall bird habitat. Rare species like the Yellow

Ranch Headquarters. They continued work on restoring the house corrals, and undertook a major project to paint the exterior of almost 40 windows and doors. They also applied additional protective mud plaster to the northeast corner of the Ranch House and cleaned the Ranch House and the Visitor Contact Station.

If you like to paint, come out for our next work day on June 25th—we've got 28 windows and doors left to go!

Billed Cuckoo require cottonwoods and willows through their life cycle.

The tree's limited commercial uses – it makes poor lumber or firewood – may have been its saving grace. Cottonwood forests have more frequently fallen victim of changes to water availability such as dams or groundwater pumping than the axe or chainsaw.

The Fremont Cottonwood's scientific name is *Populus fremontii*, after the famed explorer of the West and one-time Territorial Governor of Arizona, John C. Fremont. Fremont led the Territory from 1878 to 1881, but records indicate he served mostly from the East and in 1881 took the step of retiring to Staten Island, a contrast to the westward momentum of much of his life.

Cottonwoods are relative newcomers to the Gulch, at least in their current abundance. Evidence from the era of Fremont and Walter Vail points to a time when the streamside areas of Empire Gulch, like Cienega Creek and other waterways in the area, lacked the long continuous gallery forests of cottonwood and willow we see today. A combination of factors including lack of fire, grazing and hydrologic patterns have led to the cottonwood's current localized heyday.

Beyond the importance and historical connections, the cottonwoods provide something equally valuable – a sense of place and refuge in a dry landscape.
