The Foundation's outreach volunteers had a busy 2018 staffing booths at a variety of community events. Over 800 individuals learned about the historic Empire Ranch and the Foundation at events including the Cochise County Cowboy Poetry & Music Gathering (Sierra Vista); the Dave Stamey Concert (Sonoita); Heritage Day at Fort Huachuca (Sierra Vista); the International Wildlife Museum (Tucson); the Sonoita Rodeo; the Santa Cruz County Fair (Sonoita); the historic Canoa Ranch Anza Days; and The Fox Theater (Tucson) during a special TMC showing of Rio Bravo.


Snobbery in Arizona Brains Not Dress

Such was the headline of an article in *The Williams News* (Williams, Ariz.) on August 03, 1901...

"Arizona, the land of free speech, free thought, and free dress, is changing. There have been several scenes in one of the leading hotels of Tucson this week which might have resulted in several funerals had the participants been more sensitive and less gentlemanly."

"It seems that there is a rule that no person shall eat at the dining table unless he wears a coat. There are a great many of the best men in Tucson who do not wear coats, not because they do not possess them, but for the reason that there is more comfort without them. Scholefield and Ed. L. Vail seldom wear coats. Mr. Scholefield was refused permission [by an eastern hotel clerk] to enter the dining hall of the hotel in question because he did not wear a coat; E. L. Vail, one of the wealthiest cattlemen in Arizona, came to town this week without his coat, as he always does in summer, and he, too, could not enter the same dining hall. He explained to the clerk that he had eaten there without a coat for sixteen years, and he was too hungry to return to La Osa ranch for his coat."

The coatless E.L. Vail was Walter Vail's older brother, Edward, who came to Arizona in 1879 to partner with Walter in Empire Ranch and Total Wreck Mine operations. Ed owned several other ranches including the VR in the Rosemont Valley, northwest of the Empire, and the La Osa Cattle Company near Sasabe. George Scholefield ranched in the Santa Rita Mountains and was an Arizona cattle inspector by 1900.



Ed Vail (l) and George Scholefield, circa 1890s. (photo: Whitney Wilkinson)



Expenditures, by Use of Funds: \$119,447



Income during FY18 totaled \$114,990—64% from outreach events and other sources, and 36% from member donations. Expenditures during FY18 totaled \$119,447—72% for outreach and education programs; 14% for fundraising; 13% for general administration; and 1% for preservation and adaptive reuse projects.

Not reflected in these figures is the more than 7,930 hours of labor contributed by ERF volunteers, valued by BLM at \$185,792 for grant matching purposes. Also not included is the \$1,000,000 expended by BLM from deferred maintenance funds for the Ranch House stabilization project.

End-of-year assets totaled \$125.2K, comprising \$50.1K in BLM grant funds (fully obligated); \$25K in the Vail endowment and 11.4K in other ERF restricted funds; 20.9K in ERF unrestricted funds obligated for preservation, education, and interpretation; and \$17.8K in ERF unrestricted unobligated funds.
