# National Day of the Cowboy

ERF welcomed over 460 enthusiastic participants in its celebration of National Day of the Cowboy on Saturday July 27th. The morning started off with an informative presentation on "George Bascom, Cochise, and the Start of the Apache Wars" by author Doug Hocking.

Regina Richter, Arizona Horseman's Challenge Participant, demonstrated groundwork horse training, and Horse'n Around Rescue provided an opportunity for close-up interaction with some of their rescue horses.

Western skills demonstrations included blacksmithing by Casey Abbs; leatherworking by Phil Parks; saddle making by Brad Faulkner, reata making by Dick Schorr; and ranching tools by Bill and Kathie Schock. The Vera Earl Ranch cowboys and cowgirls and the Sonoita Royalty provided roping demonstrations and lessons.

The children delighted in visiting the petting zoo, and 27 riders took advantage of short trail rides, all provided by All Around Trail Horses.

Everyone enjoyed the docent-led tours, shopping in the ERF gift shop, and the vendor booths which featured leather products, rustic signs, photography, cookies, jewelry and household products. Balladeer Bruce Andre provided roving music throughout the day. Over \$200 was raised from the silent auction and raffle.

This fun day was made possible by the outstanding contributions of all the ERF volunteers, the Sonoita Rodeo Royalty, the Turquoise Circuit, and the demonstrators.



### Chris Schrager Wins Governor's Award

Those familiar with the stabilization and preservation of the Empire Ranch House and surrounding buildings know that BLM archaeologist Chris Schrager has been instrumental to that success. Whether it's securing much-needed grants or turning mud into adobe bricks, Chris has played a critical role in ensuring the long-term stability of these BLM structures.

The Empire Ranch was one of many projects cited as Chris received a lifetime achievement award, the Governor's Heritage Preservation Honor Award, on June 13. The Awards Ceremony was the signature event of the 17th Annual Arizona Historic Preservation Conference in Prescott.

Historic Preservation Officer Kathryn Leonard and Policy Advisor Kaitlin Harrier from the Governor's Office presented the award to Chris, who, for more than 25 years, has shared his talents as an archaeologist, teacher, and brick mason with the BLM Tucson Field Office and Coronado National Forest (CNF).

He was instrumental in the preservation of many significant properties on public lands in southeastern Arizona. These include the BLM's Fairbank Mercantile and Schoolhouse, Presidio Santa Cruz de Terrenate, and the CNF's Kentucky Camp and Brown Canyon Ranch. His projects benefit communi-

Interpretation of Room 11, used as an office by the Vails and the Boices, is expected to be completed in time for the Cowboy Festival.

We are still looking for a few items from 1890 to 1910 to finish off Room 12. Some examples include busts of famous people (politicians, composers, scientists); art glass; candle sticks; crystal plates, bowls, or vases; and glass display domes. ### National Public Lands Day at Empire Ranch

Join us again this year to help observe National Public Lands Day (NPLD) at the Empire Ranch by working on important projects to preserve resources and improve conditions for visitors. On Saturday October 12, 9am-1pm, BLM and ERF will host three volunteer projects:

—Decommission the frog head-start facility, a completed project to help recover the endangered Chiricahua leopard frog population. We'll disassemble and remove construction materials employed in the enclosure and salvage any materials for future projects.

—Repair erosion at the base of the historic adobe Hired Man's House structure. Volunteers will learn how to assess the damage and use adobe bricks and mud mortar to repair the structure.

—Maintain the Heritage Discovery Trail. Our activities will include trimming vegetation, tread work, raking, sign maintenance, and removal of two adobe seating benches.

### Return of Red River

Over 200 Western movie fans turned out for the planned outdoor showing of the classic film *Red River* at the Empire Ranch on July 13th despite the dark clouds threatening rain. Fortunately, the Adobe Haybarn provided a sheltered location to view the movie. Ray Patrone, ERF Vice President, welcomed everyone and introduced retired stuntman Bunker DeFrance who regaled the audience with a few insider filming stories. David Spiceland, a *Red River* expert from Appalachian State University, North Carolina, provided additional insights.

Prior to the movie many of the guests enjoyed the chuckwagon dinner served up by the EZ Cattle Co. Cow Camp Café and Chuckwagon, the free popcorn provided by ERF, and toured the Empire Ranch House. After the movie a number of viewers took a closer look at the Empire Ranch corral area featured in the film.

The free showing was part of The Loft Film Fest on the Road, made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts with support from Desert Diamond Casinos & Entertainment. Special thanks are due to The Loft Cinema, the dedicated ERF volunteers, and to Tucson Sunbelt Rentals for donating the use of light towers for parking.
