Departed Friend

Jim Kolbe



Former Congressman James (Jim) Kolbe died on December 3, 2022. He served eleven consecutive terms in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1985 to 2007. Jim's involvement with the Empire Ranch began soon after he moved to Arizona in 1947 when his parents, Walter and Helen Kolbe, purchased the Rail "X" Ranch, which had been part of the Empire Ranch. Located between Sonoita and Patagonia the Rail "X" ranch consisted of 500 acres of irrigated farmland on which corn, alfalfa, and barley was grown. It was also a working cattle ranch and a guest ranch. Jim and his three siblings, Walter, John and Beth, all participated in the work of the ranch. His parents were friends of Frank and Mary Boice and Jim fondly recalled visits to the Empire Ranch as a boy, especially outdoor games and swimming pool parties.

Jim left Patagonia when he was only 15 to become a page for Arizona Senator Barry Goldwater, completing his high school education in Washington, D.C. His next involvement with the Empire Ranch was in 1988 when he supported the efforts of local citizens and the BLM to bring Empire Ranch lands into public ownership through a series of land swaps, creating the Empire Cienega Conservation Area. In 2000 Jim sponsored the legislation that established Las Cienegas National Conservation Area, ensuring the protection of the Empire Ranch and surrounding landscape.

The Foundation was honored when in March 2019 Jim participated in the Special Milestone Celebration commemorating the stabilization and preservation work on the historic Empire Ranch House (see photo above). He was very supportive of the Foundation.

"...what you're doing ... is great—all the work that you and your colleagues are doing to preserve it and keep it as an educational resource for future generations I think is wonderful." [ERF Oral History Interview with Jim Kolbe, 2011].

The Original Empire Ranch House

When Walter Vail and Herbert Hislop established the Empire Ranch in 1876 two important features of the 160-acre homestead they purchased was a building and with attached corral which were constructed circa 1870 by Tucson businessman, Edward Nye Fish. Designed in traditional Sonoran style and constructed of adobe, the four-room building supported a flat, mud-covered roof. The four rooms were separated into two halves by an 18' wide and 60' long zaguán or entrance corridor. The adobewall of the corral was attached to the building so its only entrance was through the zaguán. This arrangement provided protection for Empire livestock from night-raiding Chiricahua Apaches.

The original 1870s section of the Ranch House still exist today unlike the original corral. No photographs document the building and corral. However, a sketch with dimensions and written description exists in a letter that Hislop wrote to his sister in November 1876.



His sketch showed the layout and purpose of the two pairs of rooms on either side of the zaguán. He also included information regarding functions within the corral: a storage area for hay and a stable. In his letter, Hislop described the logic of the building and corral arrangement.

"... there are 4 rooms in the house two bedrooms, kitchen and store-room at the back of the house is the corral for corralling the cattle in, the reason it is put at the back of the house is on account of the Indians so as one can keep their cattle safe at night, as that is rather a favorite time for the Indians to run off with stock"

The zaguán was an entrance feature of traditional Spanish and later Mexican architecture. Typically large enough for carriages to pass through into an inner courtyard, riders and passengers could access internal living and working quarters in safety. Wagons, stagecoaches, and later pickups drove into the zaguán to unload supplies and people.

The zaguán today (photo below) has a wood frame "meat cooler" which was



used to store freshly butchered meat, except in summer. Quarters of beef wrapped first in blankets, and then tarps, were laid on the floor of the cooler. On cold nights the meat was unwrapped and hung on hooks to further chill/freeze it. Its use for this purpose was discontinued when electric power arrived at the Empire Ranch around 1957.


Empire Ranch Foundation Financial Summary: January through December 2022

Income by Source of Funds: \$126,282

Outreach Events & Other 66% (\$83K)

Member Donations 34% (\$43.3K)

Expenditures, by Use of Funds: \$91,807



The Foundation was able to host four annual events and provide a full schedule of docent tours and volunteer workdays in 2022. For a second year, the administrator position remained unfilled with volunteers handling critical responsibilities of the position. Income during FY22 totaled \$126,282–34% from member donations and 66% from outreach events and other sources. Expenditures during FY22 totaled \$91,807—79% for outreach and education programs; 12% for general administration; 5% for fundraising; and 4% for preservation and adaptive reuse projects. Not reflected in these figures is the more than 6,555 hours of labor contributed by ERF volunteers, valued by BLM at \$196,312 for grant matching purposes.

End-of-year assets totaled \$231K, comprising \$30K in BLM grant funds (fully obligated); \$25K in the Vail endowment and \$41K in other ERF restricted funds; \$23K in ERF unrestricted funds obligated for preservation, education, and interpretation; and \$112K in ERF unrestricted unobligated funds.

Open to the Public
